## Mobilizing Support for Social Control in a Declining Economy: Exploring Ideologies of Crime Within Crime News

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*Building on a previous analysis of types of crime and characteristics of offenders in Time magazine articles about crime during the post-World War II period, this study extends exploration of ideologies of crime in the news by examining reports about the causes of crime and commands of what to do about crime in Time magazine. The authors argue that criminal justice policy and ideology have played an important role in developments within the postwar political economy in the United States.*

A growing body of literature on the political economy of criminal justice institutions and practices provides considerable evidence of a relationship between criminal justice policy and economic conditions.<sup>1</sup> Our own recent work in this area locates criminal justice policy innovations and federal criminal justice legislation in the context of long cycles of capitalist economic development.<sup>2</sup> Within a Marxian framework for understanding superstructural forms as arising out of material conditions and, in turn, affecting material conditions in a dialectical process, the criminal justice system may be viewed as a crucial component of the social structure of accumulation in the United States.<sup>3</sup> Criminal justice institutions, like other aspects of the social structure of accumulation, have historically been sites for significant transformation during critical moments in the capitalist political economy. Criminal justice practices have played an important role in bringing the economy out of extended periods of stagnation and decline into renewed periods of growth (Barlow, Barlow, and Chiricos 1993).
