

# Effective Intervention: Child Abuse Guidance On Co-operation In Scotland

Staff will try to learn from what has happened. They will always:

- Check up on your emotional and physical health;
- Explore what led up to the incident—both your feelings, thoughts and behaviour and their feelings, thoughts and behaviour;
- Work with you to look at ways of possibly avoiding what has happened in the future;
- Help you to make contact with an advocacy worker (e.g., a children's rights officer or Who Cares? Scotland worker) or to make a complaint, if you wish.
- Write down what has happened in a report (noting your views) and will let other people, including your social worker, know.
